
From a thrift store in Hilo, Hawaii. "They are paintings on bark," says Katy. "I loved them because they look so primitive. They weren't framed when I spotted them in the thrift store, but I just had to have them."

... the four-pendant light fixture.

"Somebody special-ordered the fixture, put down half its cost as a deposit, then decided he didn't want it and never bothered to pick it up," says Katy. "I saw the fixture in the 'As Is' room for a few weeks and I finally bought it after it was marked down another 50 percent. I was cheering all the way home because I knew it would be perfect in the dining room."

... the eyeball-embellished chair.

From a nonprofit benefit a couple of years ago. "Community Warehouse transitions people from homelessness to housing," says Katy. "Design Within Reach had a





the street wasn't even directly above the roof peak of the old radio station! And whoever did the 'home improvements' never upgraded the plumbing, mechanical or electrical systems. When the guy started tearing apart the old kitchen, he actually found the 1920s knob-and-tube fusebox."

Lidstrom set about reworking the floorplan, giving Katy the modern house she craved, with new spaces that would fit her lifestyle. "The house needed more of a formal entry and Katy likes to entertain and dine informally, so I bumped out the house toward the

street 12 feet, which created a sunny place with a table she can play bridge at and a heated concrete floor," says the designer, who oomphed up the home's curb appeal with a new entrance with a thick horizontal beam and a deep eave.

The Big Idea designwise, she says, was to add verticality to the cottage. "I needed to skinny things up visually," she says. "That's why I elongated the new windows that went into the house. I also added valance windows on the side of the house to get some cross-light into the living room so that Katy and Roger wouldn't feel as if they were living in a tunnel."

What was supposed to be a simple reroofing job led to the removal of the pyramid-shaped tongue-and-groove vaulted ceiling. "My trusted roofer Keith Harn of K.E. Harn Construction, with whom I've worked for 15 years, called me and said he couldn't, in good faith, do the reroofing job," says Lidstrom. "He said, 'The way this house is cobbled together and in order to create the structure that we'll need to rework the upstairs, you'd just be pouring a lot of money down the drain. You've got to tear down the roof that's up there. That got me thinking that the existing gable was too cottagey for the modern

edge that we were trying to give the house. I talked to Katy and to the structural engineer, and we all agreed that the smarter thing was to remove the entire roof. We took out the ridge, the collars and raised the ceiling height to 10 feet and those things instantly changed the house from a cottage to a modern house."

The upper level of the house was rethought into a denlike space for Roger. "All Roger really wants in any house we live in is a space that has four remotes," says Katy. "The only remote control *I* know how to use is the one that turns on his fireplace."

Lidstrom popped up a too-low dormer, bumped out 31/2 feet to make room for a new bathroom and added valance windows on a wall that had none to introduce

cross-light into the space. "Those changes turned the upper level into a functional space for Roger," she says. A new gas fireplace is angled into a corner next to Roger's plasma TV and remotes.

One floor below Roger's media room, on the main level, the team pirated the space in what had been a spare bedroom and reallocated the square footage into a powder room for guests and a roomy walk-in closet that Katy had the Portland Closet Company organize. The "pigment colors" that interior designer Penn helped Katy select as wall colors and the view of trees

through the windows in every room give the home a calm ambience.

"We worked for a long time on the wall colors," says Penn. "We considered colors that were more gold, more brown, more olive. We went everywhere from khaki to gold, but we didn't want the house to look as if it was stuck in the '70s. We wanted to get the right feel, and for the new colors to complement the furnishings that Katy and Roger already had."

EVERY MORNING, AS KATY SHOWERS in the spalike master bathroom adjacent

to her and Roger's bedroom, she appreciates the one-of-a-kind assemblages that Matthew Kennedy of Kennedy Tile in Portland grouted together from boxes and boxes of tiles that Katy found during multiple trips to the "seconds" room at Pratt & Larson.

"Noëlle was the one who first told me to go to the seconds room at Pratt and Larson," says Katy. "I didn't know then that I'd spend the equivalent of several years of my life in there! You would not believe how long it took me to gather all the different shapes and colors of tiles that I needed to do this random pattern that I saw in my head. I put together one sample square of what I had in mind and showed it to a tile-setter, but he didn't want to take on the job. When I showed that

sample to Matthew, he said, 'Oh! Frank Lloyd Wright! I love it. He took on the project and did a great job of making every square look the same, yet different."

Even as she details her hours and hours hunting for perfect tile pieces, you sense that, for Katy, the quest was twice the fun of actually finding the hundreds of white, caramel and chocolate-brown ceramic circles, squares and rectangles. And if you're a betting man or woman, you'd put a little money on the Qualman, Lidstrom and Penn team taking on another whole-house remodel—or two!—in years to come.
